**SUBJECT:** Coronavirus Update –State-wide Restrictions (Third and Last Step)

ATTENTION: Club Managers

As foreshadowed in our prior updates, the Hon Premier Daniel Andrews has today announced the further lifting of restrictions in the next step of the Re-opening Roadmap. Significantly, the announcement today included that from tonight - **11.59pm on 8 November 2020**, the 25-kilometre travel restriction and boundary between Metropolitan Melbourne and Regional Victoria would be lifted. Therefore, the rules that currently apply in Regional Victoria will now apply to the whole State (including some new State-wide rules).

Rules regarding the wearing of masks will continue to apply and all businesses will be required to comply with the COVIDSafe requirements as per Health and Workplace Directives.

The announcement today set out the next two phases of the lifting of restrictions, being:

- Third Step which applies from 11.59pm on 8 November 2020; and
- Last Step which applies from 11.59pm on 22 November 2020.

We have set out a relevant summary of the announced changes below for your information. For specific detail - please refer to the **attached** summary of easing restrictions.

## **SUMMARY OF CHANGES**

Third Step - effective 11.59pm on 8 November 2020

Entertainment and Leisure	Retail betting venue: ( <b>No change</b> ) open subject to both retail and licensed premises restrictions. Patrons must be seated unless placing a bet, purchasing food or drinks, using the toilet or entering or leaving the venue.

 Electronic gaming: Electronic gaming to equivalent of 25 per cent of indoor hospitality limit of 40 patrons or up to 10 patrons per venue per electronic gaming room. Additional COVIDSafe requirements apply.

Nb: Advice from Department of Justice and Community Safety regarding COVID Marshals

- A COVID Marshal is <u>mandated</u> for gaming rooms in hospitality venues (this is encouraged but *not* mandated for hospitality venues without gaming);
- COVID Marshals are responsible for supporting compliance with the public health restrictions by providing advice
  on appropriate physical distancing and hygiene and maintaining the records requirements detailed in the roadmap.
  A COVID Marshal would also be responsible for implementing and monitoring compliance of the restrictions that
  apply to gaming, such as patron limits and dwell time.
- COVID Marshals are required to complete the COVID-19 infection control training available at
   <a href="https://www.health.gov.au/resources/apps-and-tools/covid-19-infection-control-training">https://www.health.gov.au/resources/apps-and-tools/covid-19-infection-control-training</a>. It is recommended that
   COVID Marshals undertake this free, online training as soon as practicable, prior to the reopening of gaming.
- Venues can appoint multiple COVID Marshals, to ensure there is at least one COVID Marshal on site at any time
  the gaming area is operational. The COVID Marshal role must be their primary role when on duty, but they may
  have concurrent or additional duties.
- Further information will be included in the Hospitality guidelines which are presently being updated by the Department.
